WWU WELCOMES 11 NEW INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

International Student \& Scholar Services welcomes 11 new international students for Winter 2021 from 9 countries:

There are currently 115 international students at WWU, despite the pandemic and immigration challenges over the past year.


Loïs is from The Democratic Republic of the Congo in Central Africa. "I speak three languages: French which is my first language, my national languages (Lingala) plus English. I am a transfer student from Bellevue College and my major is Political Science/Economics, and I am glad that I have the option to study both at the same time at Western. OVER THE HOLIDAYS, YOU MAY HAVE ATTENDED CHURCHES WITH FAMILY, SCORED CHRISTMAS DEALS SHOPPING AT THE MALL, OR EVEN TAKEN A PHOTO WITH SANTA! WHILE THE MAJORITY OF THE UNITED STATES POPULATION AND CONSUMERISM REVOLVES AROUND CELEBRATING CHRISTMAS, IT IS IMPORTANT TO REMEMBER THAT NOT EVERYONE CELEBRATES CHRISTMAS OVER WINTER BREAK. AS CHRISTMAS IS ASSOCIATED WITH THE CHRISTIAN FAITH AND JESUS CHRIST (WHICH THIS DOES NOT MEAN EVERYONE WHO CELEBRATES CHRISTMAS IS A CHRISTIAN), OTHER HOLIDAYS CELEBRATED IN DECEMBER MAY ALSO BE RELIGIOUS, OR SEASONAL, OR CULTURAL, OR RELATED TO THE NEW YEAR. TO NAME A FEW, HANUKKAH AND KWANZAA ARE COMMONLY CELEBRATED IN THE US, AND AROUND THE WORLD THE WINTER SOLSTICE, BOXING DAY, ÖMISOKA, AND THE LUNAR NEW YEAR ARE CELEBRATED. LET'S TAKE A LOOK AT SOME!

HANUKKAH IS A JEWISH CELEBRATION COMMEMORATING THE RE-DEDICATION OF THE SECOND TEMPLE IN JERUSALEM FOLLOWING THE MACCABEAN REVOLT. IT IS AN 8 DAY CELEBRATION THAT BEGINS ON THE 25TH OF KISLEV ON THE HEBREW CALENDAR. THIS IS BECAUSE DURING THE RE-DEDICATION, THERE WAS ONLY ENOUGH UNTAINTED OIL TO KEEP THE CANDLES OF THE MENORAH BURNING FOR A SINGLE DAY, BUT THE FLAMES BURNED FOR 8 NIGHTS.
THE HEBREW WORD HANUKKAH (CHANUKAH, MEANS DEDICATION. HANUKKAH IS CELEBRATED BY LIGHTING THE MENORAH, RECITING BLESSINGS, PLAYING WITH DREIDELS, EXCHANGING GIFTS, AND EATING TRADITIONAL FOODS SUCH AS THE LATKES (POTATO PANCAKES) EATEN IN AMERICA, AND SUFGANIYOT IN ISRAEL (JELLY DONUTS).


KWANZAA IS A CULTURAL HOLIDAY STARTED BY DR. MANULANA KARENGA IN 1966. HE FELT THAT AFRICAN AMERICANS NOT LIVING ON THE CONTINENT OF AFRICA WERE DETACHED FROM THE VALUES, CULTURE AND TRADITIONS, AND HE WANTED TO CREATE A HOLIDAY TO ENHANCE THEIR AFRICAN CONNECTIONS. KWANZAA IS DERIVED FROM A SWAHILI WORD MEANING "FIRST HARVEST." IN THE CONTINENT OF AFRICA AND OTHER PLACES AROUND THE WORLD, IT IS CELEBRATED BY GIVING THANKS FOR THE HARVEST. IT OCCURS DECEMBER 26TH-JANUARY 1ST, AND IS A CELEBRATION OF CULTURE (RATHER THAN A RELIGIOUS HOLIDAY). DURING THE 7 DAYS, THE NGUZO SABA (7 PRINCIPLES) ARE STUDIED, WITH THE 7 CANDLES OF THE KINARA REPRESENTING THE PRINCIPLES. 1 BLACK CANDLE REPRESENTS THE PEOPLE, 3 RED CANDLES REPRESENT THE BLOOD, AND 3 GREEN CANDLES REPRESENT EARTH AND WORK. THE PRINCIPLES ARE UMOJA (UNITY), KUJICHAGULIA (SELFDETERMINATION), UJIMA (COLLECTIVE WORK \& RESPONSIBILITY), UJAMAA (COOPERATIVE ECONOMICS), NIA (PURPOSE), KUUMBA (CREATIVITY), AND IMANI (FAITH). THESE 7 PRINCIPLES CAN BE USED FOR ANYONE'S IMPROVEMENT OF THEMSELVES OR THE WORLD.

## HOLIDAYS AROUND THE GLOBE (CONTINUED)

ŌMISOKA, DECEMBER 31ST, IS CONSIDERED THE 2ND MOST IMPORTANT DAY IN JAPANESE TRADITION. FAMILIES GATHER FOR THE LAST TIME OF THE YEAR, AND CELEBRATE EATING A BOWL OF TOSHIKOSHI-SOBA OR TOSHIKOSHIUDON, AND THESE LONG NOODLES REPRESENT CROSSING FROM ONE YEAR INTO THE NEXT. AT MIDNIGHT, PEOPLE VISIT SHRINES OR TEMPLES FOR HATSUMÖDE, AND AMAZAKE IS SHARED AT SHTINO SHRINES. MOST BUDDHIST TEMPLES HAVE LARGE BELLS THAT ARE STRUCK 108 TIMES, EACH FOR THE 108 EARTHLY DESIRES BELIEVED TO CAUSE HUMAN SUFFERING.


THE LUNAR (OR CHINESE) NEW YEAR IS CELEBRATED AROUND THE WORLD, AS IT MARKS THE START OF A NEW LUNAR CYCLE. IT IS ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT HOLIDAYS IN ASIA, WITH STORES AND HOMES FESTIVELY DECORATED, GIFTS AND WEALTH SHARED WITH LOVED ONES, TRADITIONAL DANCES AND FIREWORK SHOWS, AND FOODITREATS SUCH MANDARIN ORANGES, CANDIED FRUITS, FISH, KOREAN RICE CAKE SOUP OR MONGOLIAN PASTRY TOWERS. WORSHIPPERS VISIT TEMPLES TO PRAY TO DEITIES FOR BLESSINGS AND LUCK, LIGHT INCENSE, AND OBSERVE THE FESTIVE DRAGON AND LION DANCES HELD AT TEMPLES. LUNAR NEW YEAR DATES AND THE ZODIAC CHINESE ANIMAL CHANGES EACH YEAR, BUT FOR 2021 IT FALLS ON FRIDAY FEBRUARY 12TH, AND IT IS THE YEAR OF THE OX.


THESE ARE JUST A FEW HOLIDAYS CELEBRATED AROUND THE WORLD DURING OUR WINTER SEASON (WINTER IN THE NORTHERN HEMISPHERE). SOME OTHERS INCLUDE THE WINTER SOLSTICE ON DECEMBER 21ST WHICH IS THE SHORTEST DAY OF THE YEAR, WITH FESTIVALS, CELEBRATIONS, AND CANDLE OR BONFIRE LIGHTING TO COAX BACK THE SUN. ST. LUCIA DAY IS CELEBRATED IN SWEDEN ON DECEMBER 13TH, WHERE SWEDISH GIRLS DRESS AS "LUCIA BRIDES" AND WEAR LONG WHITE GOWNS WITH RED SASHES, A WREATH OF CANDLES ON THEIR HEADS, AND BRING COFFEE AND SING SONGS TO WAKE UP THEIR FAMILY. ST. NICHOLAS DAY IS A GIFTGIVING, FEAST, FESTIVAL, AND PARADE-FILLED EUROPEAN HOLIDAY CELEBRATING ST. NICHOLAS OF MYRA, WHO INSPIRED SANTA CLAUS AND FATHER CHRISTMAS AND DIED ON DECEMBER 6TH, 343 CE. MARDI GRAS IN FEBRUARYIMARCH IS A TIME OF LENT AND REFLECTION FOR CHRISTIANS, AND IN NEW ORLEANS AND BRAZIL THERE ARE HUGE PARADES, WITH COSTUMES AND MUSIC.


LEARNING ABOUT HOLIDAYS YOU DO NOT CELEBRATE OR THAT ARE NOT COMMONLY CELEBRATED IN YOUR COUNTRY HELPS YOU UNDERSTAND CULTURE AND CONTEXT AS A TRAVELLER AND GLOBAL CITIZEN. IT IS ALSO INTERESTING TO LEARN ABOUT SOMEONE ELSE'S TRADITION THAT THEY MAY NOT FEEL AS WELCOME SHARING IN A PREDOMINANTLY WHITE AND CHRISTIAN-RELIGIOUS COUNTRY. I AM NO EXPERT ON ANY OF THESE HOLIDAYS, BUT I RECOGNIZE THE IMPORTANCE IN LEARNING AND CREATING SPACE FOR PEOPLE DIFFERENT THAN ME TO FEEL COMFORTABLE SHARING. I HOPE YOU HAD A HAPPY HOLIDAY SEASON, AND LEARNED SOMETHING NEW!
