Next week is Earth Day on Thursday, April 22nd! On the Global Ambassadors Instagram page, all through next week we will have a "guess where in the world" game with prizes, so tune in! The origins of Earth Day were in 1970, with suggestions by John McConnell of the United Nations and US Senator Gaylord Nelson, that Earth Day become an annual event to recognize the need for environmental protection and education. This is what Earth Day looks like around the world today:

United States: Rallies, teach-ins, marches, and pop-up shops for companies that support sustainability.

Canada does similar, hosting educational altalks, activities parades.

<u>Switzerland</u>: International School of Geneva hosts a green sale of recycling games and sustainable crafts to raise funds to plant trees.

<u>Denmark</u>: In Copenhagen, there is a drum celebration, March for Science, and a march to hold elected officials accountable for green initiatives.

<u>Spain</u>: The city of Granada holds a 24 hour "Global Unity and Regeneration Gathering": <u>Japan</u>: Tokyo has an of presentations and workshops on how to annual 2 day support the environment. celebration in Yoyogi

<u>Great Britain</u>: London has an Earth Day celebration, with activists & musicians, raising funds for groups fighting climate change.

Many regions in Latin America have Indigenous Solstice celebrations (instead of Earth Day) and give thanks to the season for the harvest. These celebrations are days to weeks long, with food, music, traditional dancing, and spiritual ceremonies. Below is a photo I took in Otavalo, Ecuador, when I was studying abroad (with Jeremy!) in July 2019.

Moldova:

Activities include tree planting, clean-ups, and building bird boxes.

India: Activities and dressing in green, as well as events focused on preserving the Asian elephant, and endangered species.

South Africa: Hosts Earth Expo, an educational forum on sustainable nutrition, technology, entrepreneurship, and fashion.

Philippines: Marathons! 5K, 10K, 21K, and 42K run options.



Ideas on how you can celebrate Earth Day:

- Plant a garden or start a plant collection
- Already have plants? Then plant swap! Take a trimming from a big plant of yours and give it as a gift or trade with your neighbors.
- Take a walk or hike.
- Educate yourself!
 - Recommendations: I am currently reading Bill Gates's new book "A Climate Crisis" and I highly recommend it to everyone! I also watched "Seaspiracy" (trending on Netflix) and there are mixed reviews - but I believe it is worth one's time.
- Start a compost
- Volunteer your time or donate money

- Many people post on social media, but I would recommend not spending too much time on your phone! But if you do post those beautiful photos of mother nature - maybe search for/provide some resources for your followers to donate or learn more!

JEREMY'S BUCKET LIST ---THE DOLOMITES---

The **Dolomites**, a subrange of the world-renown **Alps**, are a striking range of craggy 10-thousand foot peaks in northern Italy, 2 hours by car from Venice. They are not your typical mountains, more like Half Dome in Yosemite than Mt. Rainier. But, simpler mountain delights await, including top-notch skiing and hiking. For the adventurous, pulseraising activities like free climbing, BASE jumping, and paragliding are common in the summer.

But, it is the unique hiking experiences that make the Dolomites a perfect destination for a summer weekend. The **VF Ivano Dibona** is a classic example of the extreme, a former WWI military route that will take intrepid climbers through a system of ladders, tunnels, and bridges. But, the Dolomites are also crisscrossed by numerous standard long-distance trails, including **Alta Via 1**, which can take 10-15 days to complete. Other features of note are the **Strada delle 52 Gallerie**, which features 52 tunnels over its 4 miles journey, and **Calà del Sasso**, Italy's longest staircase at 4444 steps, 4.5 miles, and half a mile of elevation change.

So, if you love mountains, and find yourself in the area, the Dolomites should not be skipped. The experience might just be the most unique mountain adventure you've ever had.
